After the singing, Risë would open with a health talk. We both had excellent translators, though translating the health meetings always seemed to pose more of a challenge. Then James followed with the three angels' messages and righteousness by faith. God blessed richly as we moved through our topics, sharing the simple and practical aspects of the gospel and how healthful living affects the mind.

As we think back on the faces we looked out upon throughout the days, we remember how closely we bonded with those precious people. It was not easy to say good-bye.

After camp meeting we jumped a train for a two-hour ride to Stockholm. We stayed with a family our one night there, and we believe the Lord directed

us to that home. Mother and son had attended the camp meeting faithfully throughout the week. They were Christians of another denomination who love our Savior. The father had not attended the meetings, and his wife was anxious for him to learn about the Sabbath. He warmly received us and spent much time in conversation. The wife told us what a blessing she had received from attending our camp meeting—how God had convicted her about the Sabbath—and now she asked us to share with her husband how the Sabbath relates to the gospel and righteousness by faith.

Our time in Sweden was over all too soon. The last meeting closed with a focus on the New Heaven and the New Earth and what it will be like to see Jesus. To look into His face, feel His embrace and realize, as His warm tears flow with joy, that our being saved has brought happiness to His heart for all eternity.

n August Ty and I were privileged to visit the beautiful but cold (it was wintertime there) country of New Zealand. New Zealand is a land of many landscape faces. Its beauty ranges from ocean beaches to the snowcapped mountains of the south island. It is comparable in size to the state of Colorado (approximately 103,711 square miles), and the population is about 3,994,000—composed of 74.5% New Zealand Europeans, 9.7% Maori Indians, 4.6% other Europeans, 3.8% Pacific Islanders and 7.4% Asians and others. While one-third of these claim no religion, 24% are Anglican, 18% Presbyterian, 15% Roman Catholic, 5% Methodist, 2% Baptist and 3% are other Protestant, Of the 3% other Protestants,

Adventists.

Ty's invitation was to the Papatoetoe church, just south of Auckland. While there he conducted seven adult meetings, plus a few for the younger divisions, and was met with a very positive

Today, as in many European countries, Sweden is a secular country with a small percentage of its people attending church. The state religion is Lutheran.

After a very long train ride, we were met at the train station by Lars-Gustaf Larsson. Following his personal conversion as a young man, Lars-Gustaf took his family to Newbold where he was educated and became a Seventh-

was obvious, and we enjoyed his fellowship. Now nearing retirement, Lars-Gustaf is working with a small group of believers to develop a ministry in the rural countryside. "The farm," as they call it, already has a little health food store, a "hut" (a cabin for guests), a nearly finished workshop, and a couple of homes and central building.

With his small group of coworkers and a large faith, Lars-Gustaf planned an "old-fashioned" camp meeting in a tent on local public school grounds, right on the main road where passers-by could see it. His friends thought his goals and plans were unrealistic and financially impossible. In addition to this, Sweden was having a very

wet summer. And it poured our first couple of days there. We all prayed as the afternoon arrived for the truck to deliver the large tent.

Lars-Gustaf's two sons and other helpers labored to erect the tent in the pouring rain. We were awed to witness God's hand over the elements when the rain ceased just in time for the meetings to begin. The next five days were warm and sunny all through the meetings. Not a drop of rain fell.

The camp meeting was "old fashioned" in another way in that it was organized specifically with evangelism in mind—something our camp meetings used to be primarily designed for:
